
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

Purposes

- 1. to explore our experience of woundedness in our role as leaders, in carrying wounds on behalf of our Congregations, and in responding to the woundedness of the wider world that affects and calls us as Religious and also to explore the healing dimension of our role as leaders;
- 2. to share this experience with each other as peers, so as to help overcome the isolation involved and provide each other with support;
- 3. to highlight the interior contemplative life as our key source for healing and wholeness;
- 4. to identify things we can do, as leaders and as a body, in expressing our healing role;
- 5. to hear from our Executive a short report on their activities on our behalf, and on developments and information affecting us;
- 6. to be accountable for how we responded to what we undertook at the previous AGM;
- 7. to deal with regular business matters e.g. minutes, elections, messages, etc.



Jesus heals a woman.



Wounded Healers


They are not born and they are not made...

- 2. Is there something we could suggest that our LCCL Exec might do on our behalf?

Wounds don't heal the way you want them to, they heal the way they need to. It takes time for wounds to fade into scars. It takes time for the process of healing to take place. Give yourself that time. Give yourself that grace. Be gentle with your wounds. Be gentle with your heart.
